



1. What is Édu EXPO?

Édu EXPO is an exhibition in French and in English on the history as well as the specificity, vitality and added value of French-language education (FLE) in English-language majority provinces and territories in Canada.

The exhibition aims to showcase both the key figures and highlights of FLE through the years, as well as the vision for its future exemplified by young people, today's ambassadors who are firmly focused on interculturality.

2. What does Édu EXPO comprise?

Édu EXPO comprises four parts: the physical in-person exhibition, the website (www.eduexpo.ca) which is intended to be experiential, the educational guides (school and community versions) and, finally, in-person and virtual presentations.

3. Who is Édu EXPO aimed at?

The exhibition targets Canadian Francophonie and all Canadians.

In each city and on the Web, the primary target audience will be school boards' regular audience (students, school staff and parents), as well as the community in its broader context.

4. What are the key elements of the physical exhibition?

Édu EXPO will tour across Canada, stopping in 12 cities: Whitehorse, Vancouver, Regina, Winnipeg, Sudbury, Toronto, Charlottetown, Halifax, St. John's, Edmonton, Ottawa and Moncton.

Édu EXPO will remain in each community for approximately 3 days.

The facilitator on hand will bring the exhibition to life in one of the two official languages as required. The exhibition will focus on the history of French-language education and its contemporary aspect. Visitors will also be able to watch testimonials from students.

Édu EXPO is an easily transportable self-supporting structure, allowing for its rental by interested groups after the tour.

6. How do the presentations work?

Each of the 646 elementary and secondary schools in the French-language education network is entitled to a virtual presentation that will allow students and school staff to discover the history as well as the specificity, vitality and added value of FLE in English-language majority provinces and territories in Canada, with the help of a variety of supporting tools.

Additional presentations are also offered for a fee.

7. How do I use the educational guides?

Teachers can use the school version of the guide in class with their students whereas the community version is intended for use by the general public. Available on line, the guides aim to enhance the Édu EXPO experience.

8. Who are this project's partners?

9. Who funded Édu EXPO?
